Rubric Criteria

- *Character Formation: Self-Awareness* Conscious knowledge of one's own character, feelings, motives, and understandings. True self-awareness is achieved when internal understandings of self are congruent with one's external reality.
- *Character Formation: Personal Integrity* Demonstrates trustworthiness and integrity in one's life. Able to regulate emotions and behavior. Engages others with a non-defensive and open posture. Actions are congruent with values.
- *Relational Formation: Differentiation of Self* Demonstrates the capacity to simultaneously maintain connection with others and self-regulate, despite external pressure. Demonstrates the ability to maintain a non-anxious presence and to respond rather than react in stressful situations. Able to receive influence from others without abandoning one's convictions.
- **Relational Formation: Social Wisdom** Comprehends a social situation in its complexity and depth, drawing on a variety of ways of knowing. Discerns the most salient factors embedded within a relational setting. Accurately identifies stakeholders, assesses their motivations and goals, and interprets them with contextual sensitivity. Capable of responding to a social situation with wise and fitting action.
- Faith Formation: Attachment to God Understands that their identity as a beloved child of God is rooted in God's grace. Demonstrates an awareness of and willingness to engage the paradoxes and complexity of faith. An array of communal and personal Christian practices anchor and shape their way of life. Discerns the Spirit's movement for them, others, and the communities they serve.
- *Faith Formation: Embodying God's Love for the World* Sees themselves as agents of God's creative and redemptive love in the world. Engage in practices of listening to and learning from diverse neighbors. Works for justice and reconciliation. Discerns how persons and communities join God in co-creating a just and trustworthy world.
